

## **Principal's Report**

Your Grace Bishop Warris Masih, Chairman of the Governing Body of St. Stephen's College, Shri Ranjit Kumar Pachnanda, IPS, alumnus of the College and Chief Guest of the day, members of the College Governing Body, Senior and Junior Members, alumni of the College, parents and family members of the outgoing Junior Members, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen I welcome each one of you to this important event in the life of our outgoing students.

Today we bid farewell to the batch of 2015-18. Yesterday was officially the last day of teaching for the academic term and with that three years of academic life in College came to an end; college life for this batch of young men and women has come to an end and their lives are forever imprinted with the stamp of Stephania. The wider world beyond the precincts of the College beckons them and all of us are confident that they will go forth and live their lives holding on to the two important tenets of college – excellence and service.

I am pleased to place before you a very brief report for the year 2017-18. At the very outset I must tell all of you that it is just not possible to recount every event and activity that happened in college, the written record, to be created from this, will be comprehensive and contain all the details but my oral report will only, for want of time, touch upon the most outstanding achievements of the year: the activities of the Societies, the prize-winners and the achievements of the faculty and staff.

This year was one of hectic activity. All of us are aware of the fact that College was ranked at #2 in the NIRF ranking. We did not get it by chance – hard work by my colleagues, pains taking sacrifices by our Junior Members and a dutybound set of non-teaching staff are responsible for that ranking. Several landmark events mark the year gone by. During this last year we launched the official Alumni Association of St Stephen's College and topped it with a quiet launch of the Alumni Portal linked to the College website. A highlight of the year gone by was the appointment of sixteen non-teaching staff – something that was hanging fire for quite some years now. Yet another achievement was the renovation of the office block in College – a testimony to the fact that College does indeed care for the comfort and working environment, not only of its students but also of its staff.

College is distinguished by the quality of its academic work and like in the previous years, we conducted the Academic Conclave. The IQAC was exemplary

in its work and leadership and was responsible for several projects, activities and workshops catering to both academics and welfare. There is no greater joy than to see our Junior Members take wing and grow and I think the proudest moment for all of us at College was when two of our Junior Member Mr Srijit Seal and Ms Mudra Raheja conceptualised and brought to life the National Conference on Scientific Innovation – a two-day event that not only brought to life the scientific temper but most importantly, brought together scientists and stalwarts from within and outside College to discuss, deliberate and share thoughts and ideas on innovation.

You will also be happy to note that College has put in its application for autonomy to encourage academic freedom, a better and wider choice of subjects for our Junior Members, better opportunities for students and staff exchanges and greater academic and administrative freedom. In keeping with its commitment to social justice, College has also initiated steps towards regularising non-teaching staff and has also decided to prioritise housing for its non-teaching staff in the implementation of its master plan. You will be pleased to know, sir, that our alumni, not just in India but from across the globe, have been instrumental in encouraging College to go forward and continue to be the path-breaking institution that St Stephen's College always was. To this end there are several institutions both within India and abroad who have expressed an interest in partnering with College as and when autonomy is granted.

# Postgraduate Results 2017-18

Let me now go over the reports of our Clubs and Societies. I have with me the detailed reports of forty-five societies and to go over each of them would require a time that neither you nor I have at the moment; you will therefore pardon me if I highlight just the major achievements of some of these Societies. Every society has done well but some have done just a wee bit better than the others.

Among the many events of the **B A Programme Society** the exceptional one was Confluence '18 - the Society's two-day annual fest which had a workshop by Dr. Manju Mehta, from the Psychiatry Department of AIIMS, a Delhi themed Pictionary and Mobile photography session, the Kebab Eating Competition and a visit to Qutub Minar and Mehrauli Archaeological Park.

The **Bengali Literary Society** boasted of talks, a debate, a celebration of Durga Puja and the annual Bengali lunch among other events this year.

When it comes to the **Campus Placement Cell** I am not going to talk about the several students who were placed as part of the **Campus Placement Cell's** work this year, nor am I going to talk about the many students who got a good pay package - instead I am going to highlight a student initiative where one student, Jasjeev Singh - single-handedly put together an online facility for student placement.

The **Chemistry Society** continued its good work not only in the discipline but beyond with its annual trip to Jaisalmer, the online photography contest and the Charusita Memorial Lecture.

The **Civil Services forum** continued its fantastic set of exposes by bringing in experts like Ms Ira Singal, Yamini Aiyar and Vice Admiral Pradeep Chauhan among others to help our Junior Members prepare themselves.

College seems to have gone overboard with dancing as was evidenced by the activities of the **Choreography Society**. This year the Indian and Western Choreography societies merged to form one society and they performed exceptionally well both within and outside college.

Both the **Cine Club** and the **Debating Society** were active and continued the good work this year also.

The **Economics Society** had several activities including speakers, debates, workshops and paper presentations. **The Finance & Investment Cell** had Dreamerger and did some practical, social service through its financial literacy campaign.

The **English Literary Society's** highpoint was the launch of its journal *Postscript* while the **Environmental Society** promoted a Green Diwali even as they celebrated Earth Day.

The **Enabling Unit** continued to do yeomen service making a positive impact on the life and work of the differently abled both within and outside College.

The **Fine Arts Society** had several workshops and exhibitions during the year while the **Gandhi Ambedkar Society** rescuciated itself with a modest set of activities including the launch of a Journal.

The **Hiking Club** was perhaps the most active with talks, discussions, treks and regular training sessions on The Wall.

The **History Society** had its annual festival – *Kaalchakra* where we had eminent speakers like Professors Shahid Amin, Nandini Sundar and Dr Devika Rangachari illumine the audience.

The **Informal Discussion Group** had over fifteen talks which helped illumine the life and knowledge of all who attended them. The topics ranged from academics to politics to governance.

The **Leadership Cell** had its inaugural talk by Mrs Sheila Dikshit, former CM of Delhi and during the course of the year had speakers like Shri Kapil Dev, Shri Varun Gandhi, and Shri Mani Shankar Aiyar. One interesting debate on the Challenges the Nation Faces was with Lt General Atta Hasnain, Maj Gaurav Arya, Mr Gaurav Rawat and Mr Shiv Aroor.

In order or make the mingling of societies really possible we had a non-malayalee as the staff advisor for the **Malayalam Literary Society**. Talks, film screenings and the celebration of Onam were among the highlights this year.

The **Mathematics Society** had several workshops and talks conducted during the year. The activities of the **Music Society** was perhaps the most attended and the music teams won accolades not just in college but outside as well.

The highlight of the **North-East Society's** activities was the musical evening Echoes of the Eight and the publication of *Orchid*, its annual journal.

The **Philosophical Society** kept up its set of activities and weekly readings and the **Punjabi Literary Society** livened up campus life with not only delicious

cuisine but also with some great music during the annual Punjabi lunch. The **Photographic Society** conducted several workshops while the **Sanskrit Society** culminated its activities with the Inter College Kalidasa Jayanti. The **Hindi Sahitya Sabha** organised a poetry festival and celebrated Hindi Diwas.

The **Physics Society** restricted itself largely to the subject this year with talks, workshops and discussions in the discipline.

The **Planning Forum** had an interesting lineup of speakers which included, among others, Ms Shoma Chaudhary – journalist, Smt Meira Kumar and Ms Saba Naqvi. The forum also conducted the Model United Nations during the year.

The **Social Service League**, the oldest society in College continued its sterling service towards the not so privileged with evening classes on campus, teaching at GTB Nagar and clothes and blood donation camps.

The **Shakespeare Society** continued to be active with several small productions and the final Romeo and Juliet, produced with the orginal script.

The **SUS** was elected and did its bit to make college a better place through its interventions in the academic and corporate life of College through Rassmatazz, Harmony – the annual College Festival and its contributions to the National Science Conference.

In case you thought that was the end let me tell you that I have saved the best for the last. Our department of Physical Education under the able leadership of Mr Sushant Chakravorty and Mr Sujay John have not spared any effort in pushing our Junior Members to do their best. They have been harsh on themselves and have expected nothing less than the best from the youngsters. I can personally testify to the fact that our Junior Members have gone valiantly to the sports fields when the odds were stacked against them. I am proud to say that we have five international sports persons in the fields of table tennis, shooting and squash. At the national level we have over twenty young men and women who have let their light shine. In the year under review, we have won over 80 medals and trophies. Ladies and gentlemen, I am proud to let you know that we are, with the kind support of our alumni, putting together a blueprint for the resurgence of sports at College so that every Junior Member who passes through college will benefit not only from intellectual stimulation but will also be able to house their intellectual capabilities in a body that is fit and able. After all, that is one of the traditions of college – an able mind in an able body.

That was a brief snapshot of the activities of the various Societies. We remain deeply obliged to the Staff Advisors who willingly gave their time to guide and lead our Junior Members. The Societies owe the fantastic set of activities and achievements to the tireless efforts of the student office bearers. On behalf of all gathered here, I have great please in congratulating each and every Society, the office-bearers, the Staff Advisors and the non-teaching support staff who helped in producing such an eventful year.
